How the School Works

Class Organisation

For organisational purposes, schools are structured into classes. Each year it is the responsibility of the Headteacher to organise the class structure.

We have two classes which are currently established as P1-4 and P5-7.

P1-4 staffed by the class teacher 4 days and the Principal Teacher 1 day weekly.

P5-7 staffed by the class teacher 3 days and the Principal Teacher 2 days weekly.

Both are supported by a shared learning support assistant.

We have regular input from our visiting Support for learning teacher.

Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

Our school is a safe and happy place to be where everyone works together to show 'Respect for All'. Our shared values and ethos mean that children and staff build strong, positive relationships on a foundation of agreed rules for our school. We have achieved our Bronze Rights Respecting School Award and are working toward our Silver Award. We are committed to helping children to know, understand and enact their rights.

We strive to equip children with the skills and strategies they need to self-regulate, manage conflict and difficult situations and undertake restorative conversations should issues arise. Staff support children to acquire these skills both in the classroom and in other settings. We work closely with parents

to ensure that we can provide consistent and timely support to our learners.

We regularly celebrate success in weekly assemblies. Certificates and photographs displayed on our star of the week wall keep a lasting record of achievements. Pupils are awarded for achievements linked to our school values, for successes in reading and across the curriculum. Children have the opportunity to be recognised for wider achievements.

School uniform

All Dumfries and Galloway schools have a dress code which encourages pupils to dress in a way appropriate to attendance at school. For more information on School Uniform, Dress Code, and School Clothing Grants visit www.dumgal.gov.uk

Our school uniform consists of school embroidered navy sweater/cardigan and red polo shirt. Children wear grey, black or navy trousers, skirts, pinafores or school shorts. Gingham dresses can be worn in the summer months. We have a school supplier for the embroidered items and prices can be provided by the school office.

When we visit our outdoor classroom, children are required to bring suitable outdoor wear: old clothes that are warm and outer wear that is waterproof including wellington boots.

For P.E., children wear plain dark shorts, a plain t-shirt and trainers. As we often have P.E. lessons outdoors, a sweatshirt would be advisable. A reusable water bottle should be brought freshly filled with water every day.

Financial Support for Children and Families

Grants and Bursaries

Scottish Child Payment

The Scottish Child Payment is a payment for families on certain benefits or tax credits. Eligible families will get £40 every four weeks for each child under six.

Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

School Meals

Special Dietary Requirements

Facilities Services – Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

All primary schools are now operating a pre-order system for school lunches for paid and free school meals. Parent / Carer will receive a letter informing them of how to create and set up an account for their child.

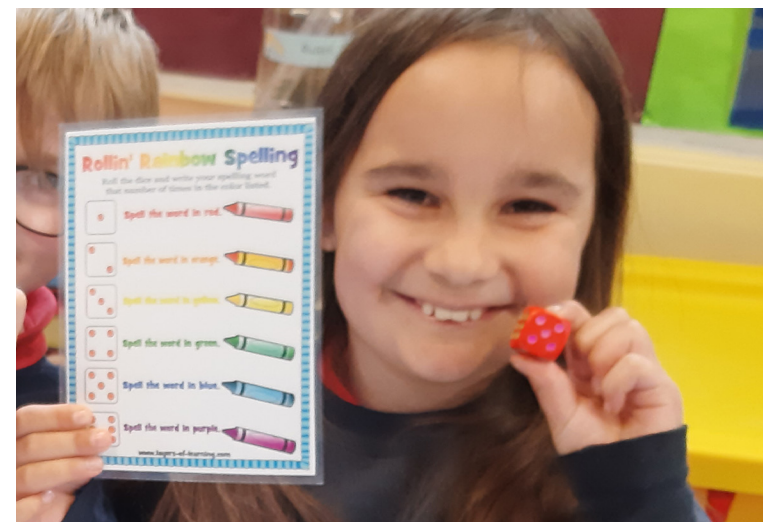
Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £360 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Absence from School

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day ie doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

We have worked together as a partnership to refresh our 3 year curriculum overview.

Outdoor Learning is important at St Mungo and we are fortunate to have our own forest. The forest offers ways of learning and stimulating creativity beyond the classroom and playground. All areas of the curriculum are covered during visits to the forest from creative writing to fractions, mini beasts and den building. The children visit as a school and work together developing cooperation and collaboration skills.

Our pupil council has representatives from primary four to seven and meets regularly with the Head Teacher. They engage in self-evaluation activities using How Good Is OUR School, as well as organise events and activities within the school: their aim is to help improve St Mungo for the benefit of all.

We are well supported by our local community and have links with the local estate, Castlemilk. It is through their kindness we have a fantastic forest we can visit. We try to make use of local facilities to broaden the children's experiences.

At St Mungo we strive to deliver a breadth of depth of learning across all areas of the curriculum delivered through a range of learning strategies. Our P1-P4 class undertake learning through Play for part of their week and staff work hard to continually develop and refresh the provision to extend children's learning. Our Older children have regular transition opportunities across a range of curricular areas with Lockerbie Academy.

Helping Your Child and Family Learning

We want all our children to be excellent readers and as such our main focus for home learning is reading. For our younger pupils we look at the early acquisition of language, phonics and modelling of reading. Our older learners focus on comprehension and inference through reading longer or more detailed text. We know that these reading skills help us to deliver a balanced literacy approach and have a positive impact upon progress in all curricular areas.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels ill during the school day and we feel that he/she would be better at home, we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. **Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.**

Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
